Dear Dr. Siklosy,

I had hoped to send this letter to you yesterday but my days are very full at present. My husband had, unfortunately, another attack of Angina on Thursday evening, and although he is now going on well, the doctors insist on absolute rest and quiet. As you know he was in the midst of planning an Exhibition, which was to be run in two series of pictures, so that it is difficult to keep him quiet with his mind so actively engaged. We hope that it will not be necessary to postpone the Exhibition entirely, but that will depend on the advice of the Doctors. As soon as he is well enough we will leave England for the South of France. Our stay there last winter did him so much good that that the strength he was able to stand up then and during this summer in the country has enabled him to withstand this attack.

I am anxious that you should know just how my husband is, but I would request you very urgently, and this is also his wish, that the fact that he has had a recurrence of his illness should not be made public, and I

know that you will do your utmost to see that this is so. It is all very unfortunate, just when he was so looking forward to his Exhibition. This week he was to have been at Weilbeck, painting a "Coronation" picture which he had set his mind on including.

We must however be glad that he is getting on so well, and I expect that if this rate of progression continues, we will be leaving for the South in about five weeks' time.
